

Welsh Rugby 2011–2026:

What Supporters Actually Talk About and Want

Processed the full SQLite corpus end to end (all **263,085** comments, **25,676** distinct authors, **2011-09-02 to 2026-02-23**). The dataset is dominated by r/rugbyunion (about 81%), with substantial volume from r/Wales and r/Cardiff, which matters because Cardiff threads include civic and asset issues as well as rugby.

Below is a full representation of what people talk about and what they want, using two complementary lenses:

- **Talk lens:** what topics appear across all comments, plus what earns disproportionate agreement (upvotes).

1) What fans actually talk about (2011 to 2026)

A. On-field dominates volume, but not influence

Using conservative keyword tagging (undercounting by design), the biggest recurring conversation blocks are:

- **Match and results:** 32,858 comments (12.5% of all comments)
- **Regions and pro clubs:** 24,892 (9.5%)
- **Players and stars:** 11,686 (4.4%)
- **Refereeing and officials:** 7,645 (2.9%)
- **WRU governance:** 7,198 (2.7%)
- **Competitions (Six Nations, URC, RWC):** 7,003 (2.7%)
- **Selection and coaching:** 5,845 (2.2%)

That does not mean WRU governance is minor. It means match chat is constant background noise.

B. What gets rewarded (agreement signal)

Average upvotes per comment is materially higher for off-field system topics:

- **WRU governance:** avg score **11.0** (highest of all tracked themes)
- **Media narrative:** avg **10.0**
- **Finance and funding:** avg **8.4**
- **Grassroots and pathway:** avg **8.3**

- **Selection and coaching:** avg **8.2**

By contrast:

- Match and results avg **6.5**
- Regions and pro clubs avg **6.7**
- Refereeing avg **5.3**

So the fanbase talks matches every day, but it *agrees harder* on governance, money, and system design.

C. How the conversation shifts over time

Grouping the full record into eras:

2011 to 2014 (small volume, skewed)

- Disproportionate early discussion about **regions and structure** and **WRU/organisational decisions** relative to the small corpus size.

2) What WRU-focused discussion is actually about

- Grassroots/pathway **18.4%**
- Debt **6.0%**
- Cardiff ownership/bidder **5.6%**
- Contraction/merge **4.2%**
- Governance reform/EGM **3.8%**
- Consultation/process **3.3%**
- Licensing/control **1.6%**

This is the clearest “what fans are really talking about” inside WRU threads:

- Not just “WRU bad.”
- It is “WRU decisions are reshaping the whole system: money flows, ownership/control, pathways, and whether regions survive.”

3) What fans actually want (not sentiment, not tone)

So the strongest longitudinal “fan mandate” is:

Get the professional structure right, make the WRU accountable, and fix the money model, while protecting pathways.

B. Post-consultation (>= 2025-10-01): what people ask for now

Extracted:

- **265** actionable statements
- From **192** distinct authors

Top post-consultation wants:

1. **Governance and accountability:** 24.5% of asks, and the highest engagement share
2. **Professional structure (regions/merger/team count):** 26.0%
3. **Money and funding model:** 13.6%
4. **Grassroots/pathway:** 9.4%
5. **Performance standards:** 7.9%

What the metrics support
